The approach of 2020 provides opportunity to reflect on highlights of OJMCHE's past year. As always, our work is guided by our mission **to challenge our audiences to resist indifference and discrimination and to envision a just and inclusive world.**

In 2019, this meant, among other things, **educating our public in the currently rising tides of hate.** To do so without appropriate urgency and accuracy is to forsake our mission. Accordingly, we offered programs that addressed this mandate – examples included *The Last Journey of the Jews of Lodz* in partnership with the Portland Art Museum; multiple workshops for students, parents and teachers about antisemitism and hate; and a harrowing talk from a lawyer working at the southern border. Of course we also, importantly, know that laughter is essential in building a truly free world. Our current exhibition *Leonard Bernstein at 100* heartens us all with the soaring music of this brilliant man.

Our mission drives us to teach our audiences this singular lesson: that we "minorities" are not isolated cases; that we have a responsibility to one another, and that indifference, passivity, and inaction to injustice can result in public disaster. In short: despite these turbulent times, **our work at the museum is life affirming and gratifying.** OJMCHE's success is due to efforts of a community of people who believe fervently that our museum is a critical asset to society. **Your on-going encouragement is essential**, and I offer my heartfelt gratitude for your support.
